

### Methodology

#### **Voters**

Global Strategy Group conducted a phone/T2W survey between August 28 and September 10 of **800** Hispanic/Latino registered voters, with an oversample to reach a total of **226** registered Hispanic/Latino voters in Arizona.

Respondents could choose to take the survey in either English or Spanish.

Care has been taken to ensure the geographic, political, and demographic divisions of the population of likely voters were properly represented.

#### Margin of error

The survey has a margin of error of +/- 3.5%.

The margin of error on sub-samples is greater.



### **Survey Objectives**

- Assess the political landscape among Hispanic/Latino voters nationwide.
- Understand how Hispanic/Latino voters feel about a host of issues, including how they feel about guns and gun violence prevention, and where that falls in relation to other issues.
- Determine the strongest message for communicating with and persuading Hispanic/Latino voters to vote for Democrats.
  - o Specifically, determine if and how to effectively infuse guns into the conversation with Hispanic/Latino voters this upcoming election.

Ultimately, we'll use this poll to help advance the narrative that gun violence prevention is a top voting issue for Hispanic/Latino voters to guide Party orgs and groups on how to best communicate with these voters






# Though Hispanic/Latino voters favor Democrats, they don't necessarily identify as liberal. And many moderates are torn on their Congressional support



# Democrats, with the exception of Biden, are generally in better standing than Republicans, though they are torn on both parties in Congress


Favorability of People, Groups, and Entities






## Harris leads Trump among Hispanic/Latino voters, though younger voters, men, and independents are torn

## In Arizona, Lake is underwater with nearly all Hispanic/Latino voters, except younger voters


Favorability of Candidates for AZ Senate

# Reducing school shootings and mass shootings are top priorities for Hispanic/Latino voters – even among a majority of Republicans




Thinking about you personally, which of the following are you more concerned about?





## Strong majorities of Hispanic/Latino voters believe the country needs stronger gun laws


In terms of gun laws in the U.S. today, do you think that gun laws should be...






# And they are ready to vote on the issue: Hispanic/Latino voters are more likely to support a Democrat that will strengthen gun laws

Support for Gun Safety Policies








## Making gun violence prevention a priority helps Democratic candidates

## We tested a series of messages both with and without guns. The guns split group heard 3 additional messages

**[ABORTION]** Extreme Republicans like the Republican candidate are pushing an extreme agenda, including banning abortion, no exceptions - even in cases of rape, incest, or when the mother's life is at risk. They support allowing the government to monitor people's pregnancies to potentially prosecute them if they miscarry. This is a decision that should be up to the woman, her doctor, and her family - not the government.

[ABORTION - GUNS] Extreme Republicans like the Republican candidate are pushing an extreme agenda that puts our lives at risk. They want to ban abortion, no exceptions - even in cases of rape, incest, or when the mother's life is at risk - and allow the government to monitor people's pregnancies to potentially prosecute them if they miscarry. They even oppose commonsense gun safety laws that keep guns out of the hands of criminals and other dangerous people.

**[COSTS]** Corporate greed is driving up costs, and rather than giving Americans more economic freedom, the Republican candidate is focused on power rather than fighting for us. Extreme Republicans take millions in contributions from big corporations and CEOs that keep them in power in exchange for letting them off the hook for price gouging which protects their profits.

**[SAFETY]** Everyone has a right to feel safe where they live. But the Republican candidate opposes policies that would increase law enforcement presences in our communities and enhance police training and equipment to keep us safe, get violent criminals off our streets, and prevent crime from happening in the first place.

[SAFETY - GUNS] Everyone has a right to feel safe where they live. But the Republican candidate opposes policies that would get violent criminals off our streets and prevent crime from happening in the first place, like increasing law enforcement presence, enhancing police training and equipment, getting assault weapons out of our communities, and keeping guns out of the hands of criminals and other dangerous people to help keep our families and law enforcement safe.

**[IMMIGRATION]** The situation at the border is a crisis, but the Republican candidate opposed the strongest border security bill in three decades - a bipartisan plan to re-establish order at the border by adding over 1,500 patrol agents, create a path to citizenship for those who work hard and play by our rules, and keep illegal drugs off our streets.

[DOMESTIC VIOLENCE - 911 CALLS] When an abuser's armed, women are five times more likely to be killed. Yet, extreme Republicans like the Republican candidate want to roll back gun safety laws, making it easier for domestic abusers to get guns – no questions asked. 911 calls for domestic violence are already among the most dangerous - for women and police – and extreme Republicans would make them even deadlier.

[KIDS - GUNS] Guns are now the leading cause of death among children and teens in the U.S., whether it's being gunned down in their classrooms or fatal accidents with unsecured firearms, yet extreme Republicans like the Republican candidate are doing nothing to stop it. They oppose commonsense gun safety laws that keep guns out of the hands of criminals and other dangerous people.

[TWO AMERICAS] In Donald Trump's America, kids are gunned down in their classrooms, cancer patients are denied life-saving care, and women lose the freedom to make their own medical decisions. The Republican candidate shares his vision and opposes commonsense gun safety laws that keep our kids safe from our violence, opposes capping the price of prescription drugs, and supports banning abortion nationwide.

# Conclusions & Recommendations



#### **Conclusions and Recommendations**

- Addressing gun violence is a top priority for Hispanic/Latino voters. Reducing school shootings and mass shootings are top priorities for Hispanic/Latino voters on par with economic concerns, including reducing the cost of everyday expenses and health care. This is a salient issue that is personal for Hispanic/Latino voters who are disproportionately affected by gun violence.
- Advise campaigns and Democratic organizations to make guns a part of their Hispanic/Latino communications. Prioritizing gun violence prevention gives Democrats an advantage because it's a top priority for Hispanic/Latino voters. In fact, a Democrat who communicates about gun violence prevention expands their lead compared to a standard generic Democrat.
- Focus on the human impact of gun violence. The strongest messaging frames with Hispanic/Latino voters emphasize who gun violence impacts most: domestic violence victims and children. When communicating with these voters, it's important to highlight the impact with these groups to convey the urgency behind the need for change.

#### **Conclusions and Recommendations**

• When attacking Republicans, connect their extremism on gun violence to their extremism on abortion. Attacking Republicans for their extreme abortion views is effective with Hispanic/Latino voters, and tying their view to their opposition to common sense gun safety reforms is even more effective. It continues to thread the needle that these Republicans are too extreme.

- Prioritize background checks, prohibiting domestic abusers from buying guns, and secure storage in communications. These gun safety reforms have the strongest and broadest support. They also fit nicely in with our top-testing messages that focus on the communities most impacted by gun violence with the goals of keeping guns out the people who shouldn't have them (namely domestic abusers) and keeping kids safe.
- To the extent targeted communications are on the table, direct communications toward women, younger voters, and urban voters. These groups of Hispanic/Latino voters are disproportionately likely to be persuadable, and communicating with them on the issue of gun violence prevention can help bring them into the Democratic coalition.
